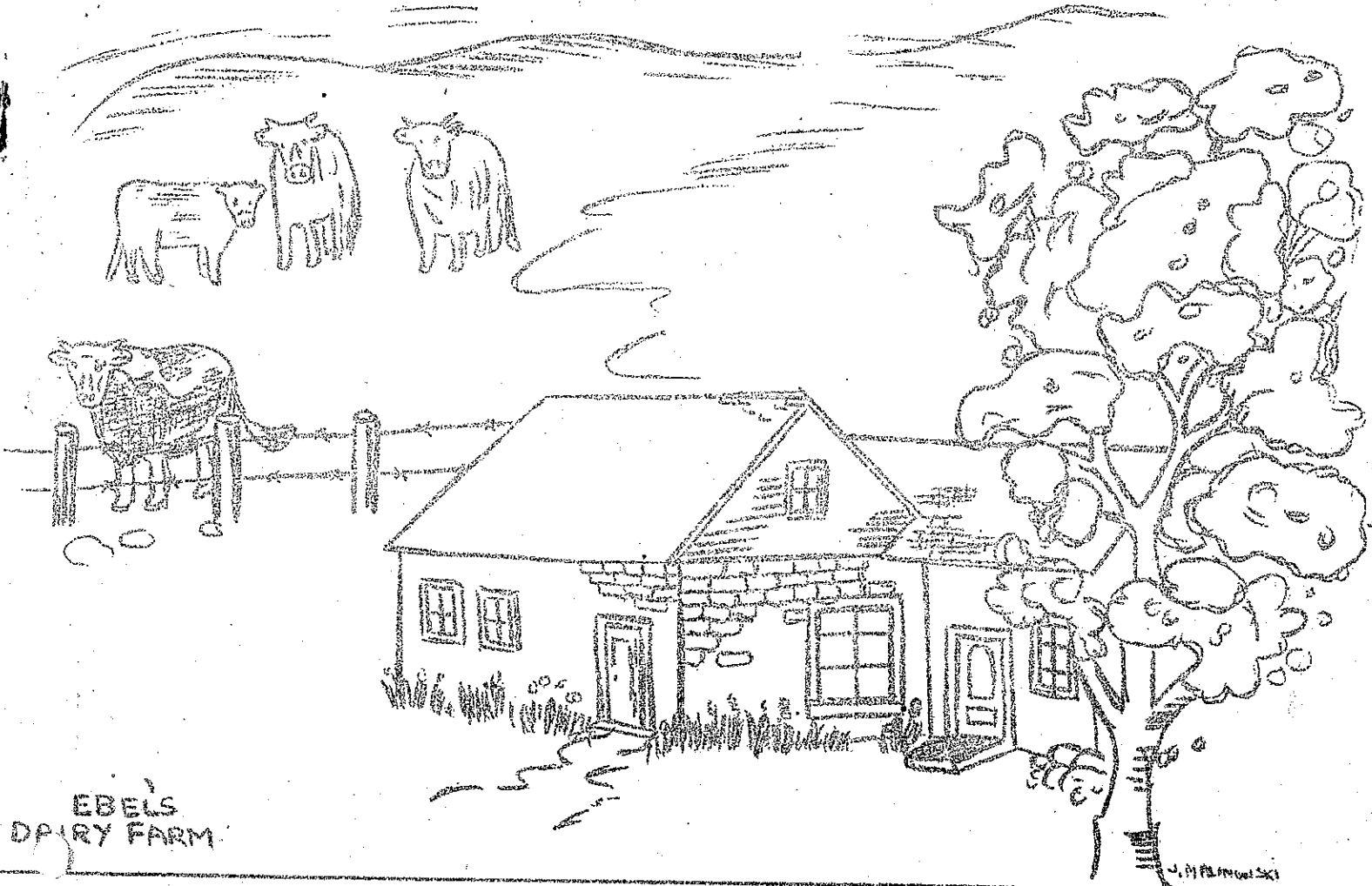

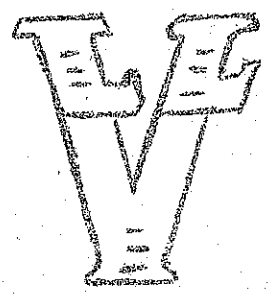

BACK STOP REPORTS

Bill Brudo--Plt Sgt. is back in Hawaiian Islands after returning from the island of Iwo Jima. At present he is working for his Commanding Officer in the 4th Marine Division.

Dick Baines A.M.W. 3/c who returned from the S. Pacific after 20 months overseas was home for 10 days. He will receive further training in California. Dick says he saw all he wanted of Samoa. He was on a Navy Carrier.

Cpl Bob Chase's answer to query: How long did it take you to come home? 22 hours he says. Bob flew from England, stopping at Iceland and Labrador. He's been over there 15 months serving as a turret gunner and Armor man on a bomber. The first 3 hours of his 30 day furlough was spent in a dentist chair. Use Pepsodent--Bob Hope advises!

Sgt. Leslie Trinder, home on furlough, is engineer gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress & has flown on some of the 8th Air Forces roughest missions over Germany, including Berlin, Leipzig, Bohlen, Kassel, Chemnitz, & Dortmund. He has been awarded an Oak Leaf Cluster to his Air Medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievement."

Dick visited England, France, received Purple Heart in Germany and was then captured and held in prison camp for 2 months. Traveling time to cruise home was 12 days. Sgt. Wiles stopped to visit his sister, June, when he reached N. Y. He will return to Lake Placid for further orders.
